Established in July 2015 by the Government of Himachal Pradesh, Baba Kanshi Ram Govt. Degree College, Dadasiba was founded to provide quality higher education to rural youth from villages around Tehsil Dadasiba, of district Kangra . The college is named after Baba Kanshi Ram — Himachal Pradesh's celebrated poet, patriot, and social reformer — and upholds his ideals of empowerment through knowledge, service, and social justice.

Baba Kanshi Ram Government Degree College, Dada Siba, was established in July 2015 under Notification No. EDN-A-Kha (1)1/2015 issued by the Government of Himachal Pradesh. The institution is named after the renowned freedom fighter and poet Baba Kanshi Ram, popularly known as the "Pahari Gandhi." The college is situated amidst the rural surroundings of Pong Dam and the Beas River Wetland in the Shivalik foothills of Kangra district. Dada Siba is also known for the historic Radha Krishna Temple, built by Raja Ram Singh in 1830. The panoramic view of the Dhauladhar ranges, along with the crystal-clear waters of the Beas River, enhances the natural beauty of the region. During winter, the arrival of migratory birds creates a serene atmosphere and adds to the area's charm.

The region is well connected through Major District Road No. 46, which links Dada Siba with important towns and pilgrimage centres such as Chintpurni, Una, Jwala Ji, Kangra, Dharamshala, Talwara, Hoshiarpur, and Chandigarh. Regular transportation facilities are available to all these destinations.

Baba Kanshi Ram (1882–1943) was a prominent freedom fighter, poet, and social reformer from Gurnwar village in Dada Siba. Inspired by leading nationalists and deeply moved by the Jallianwala Bagh Massacre, he devoted his life to India's freedom struggle. He was imprisoned several times for his nationalist activities and used his poetry to spread the message of patriotism and social awakening. Popularly known as "Bulbul-e-Pahar," he earned widespread recognition for his literary contributions and remains an enduring symbol of courage, sacrifice, and dedication to the nation.

5. AN OVERVIEW OF COURSE STRUCTURE OF NEP 2020 UG PROGRAMME

(Being Implemented from Current Year)

SEMESTER SYSTEM (For 1st & 2nd Semester only)

5.1 National Education Policy-2020:- The National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 (hereafter referred to as NEP or Policy) recognizes that higher education plays an extremely important role in promoting human as well as societal well-being and in developing India as envisioned in its Constitution - a democratic, just, socially conscious, cultured, and humane nation upholding liberty, equality, fraternity, and justice for all. It notes that “given the 21st-century requirements, quality higher education must aim to develop good, thoughtful, well-rounded, and creative individuals”. In accordance with the NEP 2020, the UGC has formulated a new student-centric “Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes (CCFUP)” incorporating a flexible choice-based credit system, multidisciplinary approach, and multiple entry and exit options. This will facilitate students to pursue their career path by choosing the subject/field of their interest.

Transformative Initiatives Impacting the Undergraduate Education

The NEP envisages several transformative initiatives in higher education. These include:

- **Holistic and Multidisciplinary Undergraduate Education :** Introducing holistic and multidisciplinary undergraduate education that would help develop all capacities of human beings - intellectual, aesthetic, social, physical, emotional, ethical, and moral - in an integrated manner; soft skills, such as complex problem solving, critical thinking, creative thinking, communication skills; and rigorous specialization in a chosen field (s) of learning.
- **Flexible Curricular Structures :** Adoption of flexible curricular structures in order to enable creative combinations of disciplinary areas for study in multidisciplinary contexts that would also allow flexibility in course options that would be on offer to students, in addition to rigorous specialization in a subject or subjects.



- **Multiple Entry & Exit Options :**

Undergraduate degree programmes of either 3 or 4-year duration, with multiple entry and exit points and re-entry options, with appropriate certifications such as:

- A UG certificate after completing 1 year (2 semesters) of study in the chosen fields of study,
 - A UG diploma after 2 years (4 semesters) of study,
 - A bachelor's degree after a 3-year (6 semesters) programme of study,
 - A 4-year bachelor's degree (honours) after eight semesters programme of study if the students complete
 - A rigorous research project in their major area(s) of study in the 4th year of a bachelor's degree (honours with research).
- The 4-year bachelor's degree programme is considered a preferred option since it would provide the opportunity to experience the full range of holistic and multidisciplinary education in addition to a focus on the chosen major and minors as per the choices of the student.
 - **Integration of Credit-Based Projects:** Inclusion of credit-based courses and projects in the areas of community engagement and service, environmental education, and value-based education.
 - **Environment Education:** Environment education to include areas such as climate change, pollution, waste management, sanitation, conservation of biological diversity, management of biological resources and biodiversity, forest and wildlife conservation, and sustainable development and living.
 - **Value-Based Education:** Value-based education to include the development of humanistic, ethical, constitutional, and universal human values of truth, righteous conduct, peace, love, non-violence, scientific temper, citizenship values, and life skills.
Lessons in service and participation in community service programmes to be an integral part of holistic education

5.2 Main Features of the New NEP Curriculum Framework

- Flexibility to move from one discipline of study to another;
- Opportunity for learners to choose the courses of their interest in all disciplines;
- Facilitating multiple entry and exit options with UG certificate/UG diploma/or degree depending upon the number of credits secured;
- Flexibility for learners to move from one institution to another to enable them to have multi and/or interdisciplinary learning;
- Flexibility to switch to alternative modes of learning (offline, ODL, and Online learning, and hybrid modes of learning.)
- Regulations for Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) and guidelines for Multiple Entry and Exit are already in place to facilitate the implementation of the proposed “Curriculum and Credit



Framework for Undergraduate Programmes”.

- **Major and Minor disciplines:** Major discipline is the discipline or subject of main focus and the degree will be awarded in that discipline. Students should secure the prescribed number of credits (about 50% of total credits) through core the major discipline.
- **Minor discipline** helps a student to gain a broader understanding beyond the major discipline. For example, if a student pursuing an Economics major obtains a minimum of 12 credits from a bunch of courses in Statistics, then the student will be awarded B.A. degree in Economics with a Minor in Statistics.

Semester/Credits:

- A semester comprises 90 working days and an academic year is divided into two semesters. The winter vacation comprises five weeks. Internship/apprenticeship/work-based vocational education and training can be carried out during the winter vacation, especially by students who wish to exit after two semesters or four semesters of study. The HEIs can decide on the courses to be offered in the winter vacation depending on the availability of faculty and the number of students.

5.3 Awarding UG Certificate, UG Diploma, and Degree

UG Certificate: Students who opt to exit after completion of the first year and have secured 44 credits will be awarded a UG certificate if, in addition, they complete one vocational course of 4 credits during the vacation of the first year. These students are allowed to re-enter the degree programme within three years and complete the degree programme within the stipulated maximum period of seven years.

UG Diploma: Students who opt to exit after completion of the second year and have secured 86 credits will be awarded the UG diploma. These students are allowed to re-enter within a period of three years and complete the degree programme within the maximum period of seven years.

3-year UG Degree: Students who wish to undergo a 3-year UG programme will be awarded UG Degree in the Major discipline after successful completion of three years, securing 128 credits and satisfying the minimum credit requirement.

4-year UG Degree (Honours): A four-year UG Honours degree in the major discipline will be awarded to those who complete a four-year degree programme with 168 credits.

4-year UG Degree (Honours with Research): Students who secure 75% marks and above in the first six semesters and wish to undertake research at the undergraduate level can fourth year. They should do a research project or dissertation under the guidance of a faculty member of the University/College. The research project/dissertation will be the major discipline

5.4 Significant Notes Regarding Choice of Subjects in for B.A. / B.Com Under NEP 2020 UG Programme

1. The prescribed credit weightage includes Lecture, Tutorial, and Practical components.
2. In the first semester, students will be offered three different subjects within the same stream: A, B,



and C (Core and Minor are provided here for illustrative purposes only).

3. At the end of the second semester, each student may choose one of two programmes: the Multi-Disciplinary/Interdisciplinary or Single Core Discipline (Major) programme. The student choosing the latter will be required to give his/her Major and Minor at the end of the second semester. Such choices, including DSCs made at the end of the second semester, shall remain in effect until the VI semester.
4. The DSCs of another discipline for the first two semesters of students who opt for Major programmes will be treated as Minors.
5. A DSC offered in one discipline will be treated as a Minor by another. Students can choose Minor Courses from two different subjects, but must earn a minimum of 12 credits in each.
6. MDCs must be selected from a broad discipline/pool of MDCs other than Major and Minor disciplines/subjects.
7. AEC/VAC/SEC-3 should be chosen from a pool of courses. Every
8. discipline shall provide these courses, some of which will be offered discipline-specific, while the rest can be open to students of all other disciplines. However, the two SECs (SEC-1 & SEC-2) must be chosen from the discipline-specific (Core and Minor).
9. A maximum of two language courses can be opted for as Core and Minor. AECs should be in a language other than what is studied in DSCs/Minors.
10. I/A/P/C will be determined at the end of the first semester to enable students to carry out some I/A/P/C activities during winter vacation.
11. To pursue an Honours & Honours with research in the 4th year, students will have to successfully complete 3-year UG Degree and choose only one discipline in both semesters, in which s/he have studied 6 DSCs and 5 DSEs in the first three years.
12. A student who secures 75% or more marks in aggregate till semester 6 (up to a 3-year degree) shall be eligible for a 4-year degree Honours with Research.
13. One course per semester (DSC/Minor/MDC/SEC/etc) from a subject offered in two (or more) different programs (e.g. BCA and BSc/ BPA and BA/ BFA and BA/ Shastri and BA/etc) must be the same.
14. Students in the BA programmes can opt for only one DSC each from the Bachelor of Performing Arts (Dance, Music, Vocal & Instrument/Tabla/ etc.) and the Bachelor of Fine Arts (Painting/Applied Arts/Sculpture/ etc.).
15. Major and Minor shall be awarded on fulfilment of the following conditions:
 - For Major, 64 credits in a 3-year & 84 credits in a 4-year UG programme in a single Major Discipline.
 - For Minor 28 credits in 4-year UG programme in a single Minor Discipline
16. The Dissertation and Project will start in the VII semester. However, the evaluation and assessment will be conducted in both the VII and VIII semesters.



Structure of the Undergraduate Programme (NEP 2020 - AN INTRODUCTION/UGC GUIDELINES)

6. Overview of Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) for 2nd and 3rd Year (Annual System)

From the session 2013-14, the Himachal Pradesh University adopted the UGC system of CBCS with an aim of improving the quality of education and the employability of students. It allowed the students to choose their subjects from a wide range of inter-disciplinary courses which are at par with other universities and colleges as approximately 70% syllabus was same across the universities of the country and only 30% deviation was allowed to the affiliating University. From the session 2018-19, the University adopted the Annual system of examination keeping in mind the difficult topographical terrain of the state.

6.1 Admissions and Course Guidelines for BA/C.Com 2nd and 3rd Year

- Admissions to the above classes is open on roll on basis. In roll on system, the students who have studied in I and II year in the previous sessions are allowed to take provisional admission in the next classes without waiting for the final result of the previous year.
- However, these students will have to fulfill all the formalities laid down by the college authorities like **filling up of the online admission form** and depositing the prescribed fee within the stipulated date and time.
- Admission schedule as notified by H.P. University will be displayed on the notice board and official website of the college.
- DSC-1 and DSC-II subjects, once chosen/allotted in B.A. / B.Com I year cannot be changed in II or III year of B.A/B.Com.
- The students getting admission in II year will have to study two Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC-1 & SEC-2) in the DSC-1 or DSC- 2 subjects/disciplines of their choice studied in first year, in addition to the courses DSC-1, DSC-2, Compulsory English/MIL in B.A./B.Com.
- SEC/AEEC in II and III years will be from DSC-1 or DSC-2 subject allotted in first year.
- The students seeking admission in B.A./B.Com. III year will study the Discipline Specific Elective



(DSE-1, DSE-2) courses in the subjects/disciplines studied earlier, SEC-3 and SEC-4 in the subject of their first choice studied and two courses of Generic Elective (GE-1 & GE-2) in an unrelated subject/discipline.

7. Important Guidelines & Eligibility Criteria for Admission to NEP 2020 UG Courses (B.A., B. Com. I)

7.1 Guidelines for Admission

1. Before applying for admission, students must obtain an APAAR (Automated Permanent Academic Account Registry) ID linked to DigiLocker, fill the ID in admission form and upload proof.
2. For the subject choices, student are required to choose one of the following suggestive combination (based on availability of Faculty in the College).
3. The subject-wise merit list (based on your chosen core subjects) shall be displayed on the college website and notice board on the dates pre-decided by Himachal Pradesh University.
4. If required, the roster for the reservation of seats across various categories shall strictly follow the rules and regulations of Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla.
5. One supernumerary seat will be created over and above the regular sanctioned intake in each course for a 'Single Girl Child' applicant, to be filled strictly on the basis of merit”
6. Students also need to sign an online anti-ragging/ anti drug abuse pledge in the form.
7. A candidate who fails to deposit the fee/dues by the scheduled date and time shall forfeit her right to admission and the seat shall be offered to the next student in the merit list for which the notices will be displayed on the notice board and official website, accordingly.
8. Incomplete admission forms and those without hard copies (at the time of counseling) of uploaded documents will not be entertained.

Note : All admissions will be as per admission schedule notified by H.P. University from time to time.

7.2 Eligibility Criteria for Admission

1. The eligibility criteria for admission to B.A, B.Com and B.Sc. in the first year is strictly as per the latest ordinances/guidelines/calendar notified by the HP University/Government.
 2. As per notification No. HP Department of Education (2) Samkaksha (equivalence) R (205) 2015.17 dated 31.1.15 of Secy. HP Board of Education, Dharamshala – a student must have passed five subjects including English as compulsory subject at Senior Secondary (plus two) level.
 3. For B.Com. Pass Course: The minimum eligibility condition for a student to get admission in B.Com. is pass at +2 level in Commerce Stream. However, a student who has passed the qualifying examination in Commerce stream will be given preference in the Commerce programme. The candidates opting for Commerce from other streams must have passed Mathematics/Economics as compulsory subjects at +2 level with a minimum of 45% marks in respective subject/s and 40% in aggregate.
3. A student who has passed Shastri, Prak Shastri from a Sanskrit College affiliated to H.P. University or Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan (Deemed University) under MHRD, Govt. of India, shall be eligible for admission to Arts stream only, provided the candidate has passed Prak Shastri or Shastri with English as one of the subjects.



4. Vocational subjects under National Vocational Education Qualification Framework (NVEQF) shall be given weightage equivalent to any other general education subject.
5. All the admissions in B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. programme will be made on the merit of +2 examination, taking into consideration the best five subjects including English as one of the subjects.
6. The students placed under compartment or failed in +2 examination are not eligible for admission to the college.
7. Admission against quota meant for outstanding students in sports and cultural activities, shall be made only once in the beginning of the session. These students must also qualify the minimum eligibility conditions for admission in that course as provided under rules.
8. The NEP-2020 structure shall be applicable only for first year students from the current academic session.
9. Major subject allocation shall be based on merit and availability of seats.
10. Students must attend counseling personally for finalization of DSC, Minor, MDC and AEC courses.
11. Subject combinations shall be governed strictly as per Himachal Pradesh University norms
12. The students of National Institute of Open School (NIOS) who have passed all five subjects by securing requisite marks will be admitted.
13. The upper age limit for admission is 25 years for girls and 23 years for boys as on 1st July, 2026. Age relaxation of 3 years is allowed for SC/ST candidates.
14. (i) All government institutions of Higher Education and other Higher Education Institutions receiving aid from the Government shall reserve not less than five percent seats for person with benchmark disabilities.
(ii) The candidates with benchmark disabilities shall be given an upper age relaxation of five years for admission in institutions of Higher Education.

7.3 Steps for Online Admission

Step 1: Login to the College Website: www.bkrgdcdadasiba.in

Step 2: Click on online admission and register yourself.

Step 3: Login with your username and password.

Step 4: Fill the application details and upload required certificates.

Step 5: Submit the application and pay the prospectus fee.

Step 6: Check the merit list online or offline on the college notice board.

Step 7: Once counselling is done, pay the fee online using your username and password.

A student must appear in person on the day of admission/counselling and carry all original documents for verification. Core 1 Subject will be given/decided at the time of admission. The dates of this verification will be notified by the H. P. University/Government.

7.4 Documents required with the admission form for B.A./B.Com/B.Sc. 1st year :

- d) ST/SC/OBC/Sports/Cultural/Handicapped/ IRDP/ BPL Certificate for those seeking relaxation in age/marks/fee etc
- e) Bonafide Himachali Certificate if applicable (for girls only)
- f) Aadhar Card
- (v) Form for gap year if there is break in continuity after last exam passed
- (vi) Anti-Ragging form (to be downloaded from: www.antiragging.in)

NOTE: Take a print of the application form submitted online and attach all the documents uploaded while filling online form. All original certificates must be produced at the time of Admission/Counselling.

7.5 Age Criteria (Upper Age Limit)

- An applicant must not be more than 23 years of age (25 years in case of girl students) as on July 1, 2026. A relaxation of 3 years is applicable to candidates belonging to SC/ST category.
- The Vice-Chancellor, HPU may, in exceptional cases/circumstances, to be recorded in writing, give relaxation in age up to a maximum of 6 months to any candidate. All such cases of age relaxation of up to six months may be granted admission provisionally by the Principal and a consolidated list of all such cases will be sent for approval to the Vice-Chancellor by 31st October of every academic year.
- Relaxation in upper age limit is admissible to physically challenged candidates also.

Note:

- All admissions made by the college are provisional till regularized by H.P. University.
- University ordinance shall be strictly adhered to for admission to all classes.

7.6 RESERVATION OF SEATS FOR ADMISSION (ORDINANCE 3.14)

The college follows the reservation policy of H. P. Government adopted by H. P. University in admissions. The following reservations are in accordance with the reservation roster of H. P.

University:

Scheduled Caste (SC)	15%
Scheduled Tribe (ST)	7.5%
Sports (SP)	5%
Cultural Activities (CUL)	5%
Persons with Disability (PwD)	5%
Economically Weaker Section (EWS)	10%

These reservations will be applicable to those who have passed their qualifying examination from H.P. Board of School Education or from any other school located within the territorial jurisdiction of Himachal Pradesh or bonafide residents of Himachal Pradesh. Seats under Sports and Cultural quotas will be allotted to those students who have participated in events recognized by HPU Sports and Co-Curricular Council. For seat reservation, the 120 Point Admission Roster will be followed:

Note:

- The roster for admission shall be in accordance with the as per the ordinance of H.P. University, Shimla notifications issued from time to time.
- One seat will be reserved for single girl child, over and above the allotted seats, in each subject.
- The candidates applying for sports and cultural quotas should furnish the hard copy of supporting documents along with the admission form on or before the date as notified in



university admission schedule in the Department of Physical Education.

7.7 Migration

Students pursuing their 3-year Undergraduate programme through the regular mode (i.e., a student from any college affiliated with H.P. University) can transfer their admission to CDOE at any point during a semester. Such a student, however, shall have to pay the complete Semester fee of the concerned semester as well, irrespective of the duration of the semester gone by. Students pursuing their 3-year Undergraduate programme from CDOE can be migrated or admitted as regular students to colleges against vacant seats at the beginning of the semesters.

7.8 Inter-Institution Mobility

The HPU-UGP enables students to engage in inter-institutional mobility, both for incoming and outgoing students. For this, HPU will take into account the credits that the student has in their ABC. For an incoming student, the following should be observed: a. b. c. 16. The entry is subject to the availability of seats in the concerned discipline. The student must fulfil all the academic prerequisites of the relevant discipline. HPU will award a degree to a student only when the student has completed at least 60% of the credits for core courses offered by HPU.

7.9 Academic Bank of Credits (ABC)

The HPU-UGP is directly connected to the Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) as notified by the UGC, All credits a student earns at the end of an examination in HPU-UGP will be deposited in the ABC by the university. As such, a student under HPU-UGP must register for the ABC as notified by the regulatory agencies.

8. Guidelines for Admission to B.A./B.Sc./B.com. 2nd & 3rd year of CBCS UG Programme (Roll-on Basis as Existing Students)

- i. The students of B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. 2nd & 3rd Year are required to first fill the online admission form and subsequently submit the hardcopy of this admission form, complete in all respects, to the concerned Admission Committee as per the schedule given at the inside of the cover page.
- ii. Notwithstanding eligibility for admission, the Principal may refuse admission, if the conduct of a student has not been up to the mark during the previous semester/Year.
- iii. A student disqualified/expelled/rusticated by any other College/university shall not be admitted to any course during the period of his/her disqualification. (HPU Ordinance No. 3.6)
- iv. Any gap (latest) in the academic career of an applicant must be supported by a documentary evidence/ affidavit as the proof of his/her activities during the period of gap.
- v. Bonafide-Himachali Certificate for the exemption of tuition fee. (only girl students)
- vi. Character certificate issued by a gazette-officer, in case of an ICDEOL candidate.
- vii. All admissions are provisional unless regularised by the University and the College will assume no responsibility, in case, the University, for any reason whatsoever, does not approve the admission of a student.
- viii. The Principal reserves the right to refuse or cancel admission without assigning any reason.

IMPORTANT: Since the examination is to be completed within one month only, hence the students must understand that they may have to appear in two or more papers on the same day, particularly the papers of the duration of 2Hrs & 1.5 Hrs.

PASSING CRITERIA:

1. ESE: 35%
2. CCE: 35%
3. PRACTICAL/DISSERTATION/VIVA-VOCE (IF ANY): 35%
4. AGGREGATE: 40%

RE-APPEAR EXAM: A student will be given the chance of reappearing in a compartment paper only with the students of that semester next year. No separate exam will be conducted in-between.

IMPROVEMENT OF DIVISION : A student will get only two chances to improve the division. However, the degree is to be completed in seven years only.

RE-CHEKING/RE -EVALUATION: Students must apply for re-checking/re-evaluation within ten days of the declaration of their results.

RE-ENTRY (if any) is to be made within three years of Exit.

ON-LINE COURSES: Though a student can earn 40% credits from on-line courses, however, such courses are to be finalized/approved by the HPU.



9.3 SCHEME OF EXAMINATION FOR THE 2nd & 3rd YEAR STUDENTS (CBCS)

Credit determination

An undergraduate program degree in Humanities / Commerce may be awarded if a student completes 4 core papers, each in two disciplines of choice, 2 core papers each in English and MIL respectively, 2 Ability Enhancement compulsory courses (AECC), minimum 4 Skill Enhancement courses) SEC, 2 papers each from a list of Discipline specific Elective papers based on the two disciplines of choice selected above, respectively and two papers from the list of Generic Elective (GE) papers. BA / B.Com degree will be awarded if the student acquires 132 credits.

Evaluation System:

All courses involve an evaluation system of students that has the following components:

1. Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA) accounting for 30% of the final grade that a student gets in a course. 30% assessment will be determined on the basis of class room attendance (out of 5 marks), Midterm (Minor) Test (out of 15 marks), Assignments / Seminars (out of 10 Marks).
2. A student will have to attend at least 75% lectures/Tutorials/Practicals. A student having less than 75% attendance will not be allowed to appear in the End semester examination.
3. Classroom Attendance Incentive: The incentive for the classroom attendance (for those participating in Co- curricular activities, 25% will be added to per cent attendance) will be awarded CCA marks as follows:

75% but < 80%	1 mark
80% but < 85%	2 marks
85 % but < 90%	3 marks
90 % but < 95%	4 marks
95% and above	5 marks

4. End Year/Semester Examination will be accounting for the remaining 70% of the final grade that a student gets in a course. The End year/semester Examination will be of three hours' duration and will be covering the whole syllabus of the course. Odd semester examination will be in the month of November/December and for the even semester, it will be in the month of May/June.
